Sonoma County Coast Long-Term Data Sets

Looking back sixteen years, our coastal stewardship effort in the far NW corner of the County began in 2007. That was the second, and last, year that Fourth of July fireworks were sent up over the ocean towards Gualala Point Island. Folks had been concerned that the action disturbed nesting seabirds----and they were correct! Volunteers from Madrone joined with locals near Sea Ranch to observe, record, verify and photograph. Over several summers, Santa Rosa help came from: Betty Burrridge, Bryant and Diane Hichwa, Elmarie Hutchison, Phil Persons, Phyllis Schmitt, Bob Speckels, Dennis Wheeler and Ken Wilson. Visually and in photos we verified Brandt's Cormorants taking off in the darkness as fireworks exploded and then documented nests that failed in the following two weeks. Those became testimony before the California Coastal Commission. The seabird nesting study begun in 2007 persists today with a long-term data set. In 2007 and 2008, some

Common Murres were seen, "prospecting." By 2012, they were confirmed to be nesting---the first documented nesting in Sonoma County---and they persist today at Gualala Point Island and south of Goat Rock near Jenner. In both locations, the Common Murres stand amidst the Brandt's Cormorant nesting colony.

The rocky intertidal nesting Black Oystercatcher (BLOY) is considered “climate endangered” and is listed as a “species of high concern” by both U.S. and Canadian Shorebird Conservation Plans. One study we participated in counted Black Oystercatcher nests, from the NW corner of Sonoma County to the SW corner of the County. This count was made more difficult by the large areas of privately held land with no access. Many Madrone and Redwood Region Ornithological Society members helped locate and count nests. This data was added to information from the entire coast of California. It is about time to repeat this survey to see if the oystercatchers are “holding their own.” Another coastal stewardship study in a 10-mile stretch in far NW Sonoma County ran from 2011 to 2021, a study of nesting Black Oystercatchers and their success. This data is part of a set from parts of Mendocino County south to San Luis Obispo. Noted were: types of nesting locations (offshore rocks or onshore), success of fledging a chick, and types of disturbance. This ten-year study is being analyzed now and is being prepared for publication. Following that, in 2022, we began participation in a 5 to 10-year “Index Survey” of Black Oystercatcher nesting, consistently monitoring a randomly selected sample from the BLOY breeding pairs monitored as part of the 2012-2021 California coastwide monitoring effort.

Active Nesting Season - Petaluma Wetlands

Madrone Audubon recently coordinated a meeting with CA Dept. of Fish and Wildlife Warden Demetri Esquivel and City of Petaluma Parks & Recreation and Public Works staff, along with the Petaluma Wetlands Alliance (PWA) President. The gathering was to help elucidate requirements of the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and State Fish and Game Code for protection of nesting birds. Nesting season is February 15 to early September. We’re now coordinating nesting surveys for April, to demarcate active nesting areas with flags or colored markers – to prevent injury or harm from vegetation management activity or unnecessary encroachment. Biologist Lisa Hug has agreed to conduct the surveys, and we are grateful. An anonymous donor will cover the expense for the work. Standard procedures during this important season include no use of power equipment in the vicinity of or encroaching into active nesting sites. The Petaluma Wetlands are comprised of the Ellis Creek property, Shollenberger Park and Alman Marsh

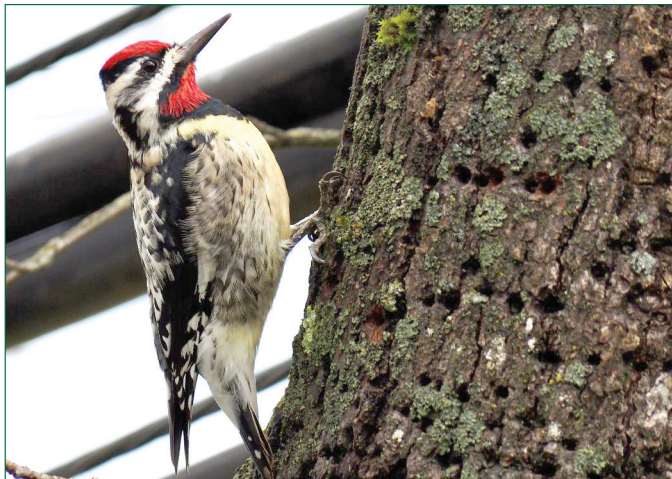

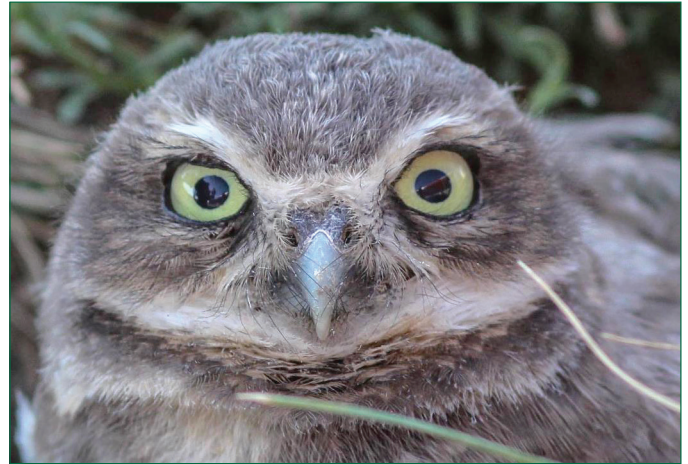

Into the Wild at Schulz Museum

Wednesday, February 22nd, was a great day of fun and education. The theme for this year's Home Schooling Day at the Charles M. Schulz Museum in Santa Rosa was "Into the Wild." Madrone Audubon shared a display with Paula Lane Action Network (PLAN) for our activities. Students, guardians and parents stopped by our display to learn about different habitat types and to match wildlife and bird figurines with mounted photos of habitats. The habitat choices included grassland, hills, mountains, forests, areas of trees and grassland, the ocean, and an international choice of the African plain.

Students selected various figurines from a total of about 35 in a basket to place in front of mounted habitat photos. We learned and talked about one habitat where only certain wild creatures can live and survive (the ocean) and also discovered that some birds and wild creatures move from one habitat area to another – seeing that keeping open areas for movement and forested areas to help birds is very important. Sets of blank coloring pages for home enjoyment were also given – Common

Spring 2023 Happenings

West 9th Street Nesting Support Project – Beginning the 11th annual project, Madrone Audubon will manage the encroachment permit for the nesting area of Great Egrets, Snowy Egrets, Cattle Egrets and Black-crowned Night Herons. We enjoy collaborating with Audubon Canyon Ranch observers who document the nest counts and species. We will provide support for the Bird Rescue Center's amazing volunteers who monitor the area 24/7, to rescue fallen nestlings and/or injured adult birds. The installation of fencing and straw mats is planned for the second week in April.

Students will walk from the school to a grassy area near the heron and egret nesting site, and will learn to view nests and birds through scopes. 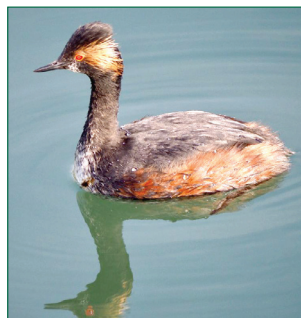

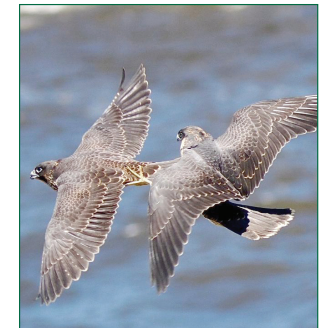

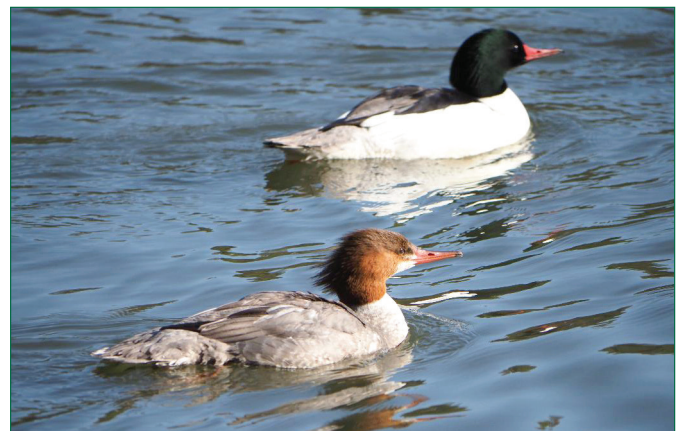
