HELLO MADRONE!



We want to hear from you.


What do you consider to be Madrone's super powers? Where should Madrone be focusing its efforts? What do you want Madrone to be?

Carolyn (CJ) Johnson – President

Carolyn has 25 years of experience in nonprofit board service and governance. She spent 15 yrs on the board of Laguna de Santa Rosa Foundation – 3 years as Board Chair, and 10 years on Point Blue Conservation Science's board, also 3 years as Chair. In 1999, she and a small group developed the Learning Laguna Environmental Education program and continues to be involved today. From SSU, she earned an interdisciplinary master's degree focused on wetland biology and land use policy. She has been a CBC participant since 1985, and territory leader for ~30 years. CJ describes herself as a collaborative and inclusive leader.

John Lundblad – Vice-President

John's experience in bird watching started in 1990 when he assisted his brother banding songbirds in the Sierra Nevada. He was invited to participate in the bird censusing project at McCord Ranch. He is currently co-leader of the Madrone Christmas Bird Count. John has been a middle school teacher in Santa Rosa for 19 years, managing 120-150 students every day, developing curriculum to address science learning and teaching standards. He also teaches art and MAKER. Prior to teaching, John worked at Clos du Bois Winery as an enologist. He loves to backpack, bicycle, flyfish, and make wine.

Claudia Norby – Treasurer

Claudia has been birding since the 90's and yet still considers herself an enthusiastic but intermediate birder. She says she has benefitted and learned much from being a Madrone member, particularly from the field trips. Claudia has previous experience as a nonprofit board member and has had budget oversight experience as an attorney. She is glad to be serving as Madrone's Treasurer.

Sandra Settle – Recording Secretary

Sandra is an enthusiastic birder and advocate for wildlife conservation and is excited about her new role on the Madrone chapter's board. Sandra has lived in Santa Rosa for more than 35 years, and has been active in the birding community with her late husband, Bill Payne. Along with love of birds, she brings writing and organizational skills from a local teaching career.

Marie Witt – Correspondence Secretary

Marie is thankful to be serving on Madrone's board. She was introduced to birding by her husband. Since then, she has been an active participant for the last 14 years on the Christmas Bird Count. She brings to the position 13 years of Administrative Assistant experience including knowledge of Microsoft Word and Excel.

Stacy was Co-coordinator and co-compiler of the Madrone Audubon Christmas Bird Count with Peter Leveque for ten years. He also served as Correspondence Secretary for Madrone. His professional career was in two parts: as consulting aquatic biologist from 1980 to 2001, and a fish ecologist and water rights specialist for NOAA's National Marine Fisheries Service dealing with Endangered Species issues. He was the first and only enforcement biologist in the agency's history. Domestically, he has been married to Marguerite since 1970, and has a son and a daughter that have each provided a grandson and a granddaughter.
